MATHS-Last week we looked at Maths in school and it was good to see a consistent approach to teaching across the school. Some of the White Rose maths can be challenging for our year one children, but they are pretty determined to figure it all out, it is always a nice to see that 'lightbulb' moment when it clicks into place.

SILENT SIGNALS-In school we are focusing on using the silent stop signal, it's such a simple and polite signal. The teacher raises her/his hand when they want the children's attention, and children raise theirs in return and stop talking. The more quickly they raise their hands the quicker the lesson moves on. There's no tambourines or bells, children stop in a calm manner, ready for the teacher to give instruction. This isn't new to our school, but it is new to our reception children, so it is helpful to have a whole school spotlight on behaviour. We use other silent signals which can be very effective when used consistently in all classes.

Story of the Week

In Pendeen this week we have been finishing off our topic work on 'Let's Explore'. The children have looked at different explorers of the past such as Marco Polo and Amelia Earheart. We have been looking at where we might like to visit and what sort of things we would have to pack to take with us on a trip such as swimming goggles or a woolly hat.

The children have been learning about Diwali, and how the word Diwali means 'rows of lighted lamps'. The children listened to the story of Rama and Sita and how this is a story that is important to Hindu's during this celebration. The children have made their own diyas using clay that they have then decorated.

The children have settled into school life so well. It has been a very busy first half of the term for them and I hope that they all have a wonderful half term break.







This week in Trevose, the children have applied their past learning with The Three Little Pigs to write, publish and edit their own story about Little Red Riding Hood.

In guided reading, some of the Year 2s have been engaged with a new text, Brer Rabbit's Trickbag, and have begun to enjoy this tale about a rabbit who plays tricks on his neighbours. All children continue to make progress with their RWI phonics lessons, which it is clear are impacting their writing and spelling.

In their maths learning, the Year 1s have made great progress with addition and subtraction bonds to 10, where they have been challenged to find all fact families for certain bonds. The Year 2s have been recognising how to subtract when crossing the tens by partitioning and subtracting to arrive at the previous tens number first.

In science the children have been applying all of their knowledge and understanding about materials and their properties to complete some assessment pieces, where they can really demonstrate their learning.

They have learnt about the importance of recycling and the affect it has on our planet.

In Art, the children have studied Kandinsky's Circles as a stimulus for creating their own circle paintings using different hues. They took care and paid attention to detail in this art topic and have produced some great results.

It's hard to believe that we are already at the end of half-term. The children have all settled well into their new school year and come to school enthusiastically and happy! Have a well-earned half-term!

In guided reading, we have been enjoying the book Jack Slater Monster Investigator by John Dougherty and in literacy, we have begun our independent writing of a setting description using preposition and onomatopoeia. In maths, Y3 are continuing addition and subtraction and Y4 are working on area.

In science, we constructed and interpreted food chains and identified producers, predators and prey. In history, we explored how grave goods can give us information about the past and considered what types of objects would survive over time.

Lots of children have worked hard this week in showing respect and earning tokens. We've also read over 565,000 words as class this term (recorded on accelerated reader quizzes). Well done Tater Du, you deserve a rest - have a great half term everyone!



In P.E, we have been applying our knowledge of different exercises to create our own circuits for our friends to complete.










Job 23:1-9,16-17 Do you know who I am?

As we continue our journey through Job, we come to a dialogue between Job and God. Rather than providing words of comfort in Job's suffering, God points Job towards his power as the creator of the universe. God's omnipotence throws Job's creatureliness into stark relief.





Draw on your mirror with white board pens. What does God love about you? Draw a picture or words and arrows to record what God loves about you.





God demonstrates his care for creation in the passage. Made in God's image, humans carry this responsibility to care for our world. How can you demonstrate care for the planet today? You could, pick up litter, plant some bulbs, water indoor plants or care for a pet, and reflect on how God sustains us all.

Does God change or do the writers' understandings of God change? CS Rodd suggests thoughts of the rather sentimental "fatherhood" of God that have become common in modern Christianity.

God in Job is the omnipotent and omniscient creator1. One could say God in Job is like the drill sergeant Emil Foley, played by Louis Gossett Jr in the classic film An Officer and a Gentleman. Foley's sole mission seems to be to get new recruit Zack Mayo (played by Richard Gere) to 'man up' (cf 'Gird up your loins like a man', Job 38:3), putting him through an endless sequence of hellish physical and psychological tests. The whirlwind (38:1) emphasises the power and transcendence of God. The verses that follow form quite a contrast to chapter one, when God is celebrating Job. Here God addresses Job very harshly. One commentator describes it as the divine cross examination. In verses four to seven, we have a picture of creation in keeping with the religio-scientific thinking of the time. Pointing to the complexity of creation, God none too subtly lets Job know who
